For the purpose of this investigation, I shall include the eleven Southern States which, in 1900, contained 7,199,374 of the 8,840,789 Negroes then living in the United States, or 81.4 per cent. of the Negro population of the country. These States are Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas and Tennessee. In these eleven States the total population in 1900 was 18,975,665, of which 11,776,391 was white and 7,199,374, or 40.1 per cent. was Negro. First. In order to find out whether the Negro public school is a burden on the white taxpayer in these States, it is necessary, first of all, to ascertain what these States are spending for public schools,...
